

We had food and fellowship from 5:00-5:30 followed by **President Rosenquist** sending out a welcome to all and especially to our speaker, Dr. Whitney Oakley, Superintendent of Guilford County Schools; Tracey Lewis, a member of Alpha Theta (Surry County) and Chief Communications Officer for Guilford County; Mary Pickett, Region VII Director; and Mary Bogest, feature writer for High Point Enterprise. Janet Flynn introduced her guest, Dr. Dian Carr.

Phyllis McCoy shared a reading for the invocation.

Betty Mayer introduced Chi's new members: Susan Howard Hedrick, a former Chi president, was reinstated and is mentored by Kay Tucker; Sue Horney is a newly retired lower grade teacher from Westchester Country Day School and is mentored by Pat Sams; Wendy Kitley, a former member of Beta Xi and third grade teacher at Southwest Elementary, was reinstated in Chi Chapter. She is mentored by Betsy Hodge; Christina Mayhand, Stem teacher at Guilford Elementary, is mentored by Betty Mayer; Emily Newsome, student at HPU and our 2023 Alice Armfield grant winner is mentored by Mary Ann Hart. A gift box of assorted fudge candies was presented to each new member. Sue Horney led the singing of "Happy Birthday" to Emily Newsome for her 21st birthday!

Dr. Whitney Oakley, Superintendent of Guilford County Schools, spoke to the successes and challenges of the 50th largest school system in the nation. The system serves 68,000 PK-12 students and 10,000 employees at 126 schools. Successful programs that Dr. Oakley wants to continue are Early College at Guilford; Guilford STEM College at A&T; High Dosage Tutoring for about 11,500 students involved in

300,000 sessions that resulted in higher math growth for grades 6-12 when compared to the state scores; Learning Hubs that have resulted in high attendance and better graduation rates; and involving the community at large to tutor in our schools. A federal mental health grant of \$3.7 million will be a part of the effort to eventually have school-based clinics in all Title I schools. Twelve new tactics for safety strategies have been implemented. Plans to upgrade or build new schools are being acted on through the recent \$2 million bond being passed. Dr. Oakley praised the commitment of the community. To better support the principals, teachers and students, the system is now organized into new school zones. Also, a satellite central office for the county will be at Congdon Yards as a nod to the High Point community support for public education. Al Johnson has been hired as the full time coordinator. Guilford County has its challenges with 23 out of 25 Title I schools having universal free lunch, a smaller percentage of college educated parents and more concentrated poverty in the system than found in comparable school systems in our state. Dr. Oakley remains committed to making sure our students grow and succeed and that we maximize resources for students. President Rosenquist presented Dr. Oakley our thanks with a gift basket.

Quorum was established. **Minutes** from the March 28, 2023, meeting were approved and filed after a motion from Kathy Smith and a second from Betsy Hodge.

President Rosenquist presented the Chi Strategic Goals. Susan Martz made a motion to accept, Rhonda Hunt seconded, and the goals were unanimously approved.

President Rosenquist led the Chapter Collect. **Susan Martz** led the Delta Kappa Gamma Song.

Membership Committee: Betty Mayer, chair, announced that the Giannos 3rd Fun Friday in October would be cancelled because of the work for the fundraiser on October 21. Betty asked members to take a pencil and a Chi DKG brochure to recruit new members for Chi. More pencils and brochures are available from Betty if needed. Betty will send out an email about orders for new badges. She asked those

who needed to purchase a new badge to pay for it at the Holiday Tea in December. A Jewelry Box Pin Swap Program will now allow members, on a voluntary basis, to trade in a pin such as a "Years of Service" pin when there is an upgrade. The hope is to save members some expense.

Impacting Personal and Professional Pride: Betsy Hodge, chair, praised the work that Nancy Tucker has done for Chi for the past 20 years and noted that Nancy was our first Member Spotlight submission for the September newsletter. Nancy is stepping down as treasurer at the end of this year. Let Betsy know if you are interested in taking over this treasurer's position. Betsy asked those who have a submission for the Spring Arts Gallery to find the February 15 guidelines on the International website. There are many genres of art available for submissions. If there are any honors, awards, or classroom news items you want to share, let Betsy know about it. Chi wants to celebrate You!

Global Awareness: Rhonda Hunt, chair, announced the replacement fundraiser for Water Bottles for Africa. "Bragging Rights" at \$2 a brag can be shared at meetings and through a written submission as a new feature of *Keynotes* newsletter publications. This way, members who were not able to attend the in-person meeting can have her brag published. Also, Rhonda will "Pass the Hat for Schools of Africa" at each meeting for this effort. Brags for this meeting included Debbie's lamb winning in a show at the fair and her granddaughter at age 10 proved that she could flip a lamb for sheering and hooves trimming, Susan Martz is downsizing, Susan Hedrick and her husband volunteer at Northwood as part of our superintendent's initiative to get volunteers, and Sylvia wanted all to know that things are going well with her and Gayle. Scholarships and Grants: Kay Tucker, chair, announced guidelines for grants through Chi. Kay said that the committee can give different amounts and as much as possible to any one applicant. An interested member must send a request for an application to Kay Tucker by email. October 24 is the due date. Recipients will be announced at the Holiday Tea in December. Kay, also, provided a hard copy of grants and scholarships available at the state and international level. Members can access this information on websites at DKG International and ncdkg.org.

Leadership Development: Susan Sumpter, chair, is in the hospital. President Rosenquist encouraged members to submit articles to the DKG Bulletin at dkgbulletin.org. Our president has submitted an article. We wish Susan Chi's best.

Projects: Phyllis McCoy and Teresa Owens, cochairs, announced that the HPU Mentor/Mentee program will continue, and mentors were invited to specific programs. Teresa Owens will keep the mentor group informed of events. Phyllis announced that the collection of books for High Point L.E.A.P.'s Five Little Free Libraries will end February 21 with a work session at her house to sort the books into age appropriate categories. At the same time, Family Justice Center Activity Bags for Children will be filled. Activity bags entertain the children of parents having counseling at the center. Phyllis encouraged members to order books and to have them shipped to her home if that would be easier to do. Books at all levels K-12 are welcome but books are especially needed for middle schoolers. A group of children from the High Point L.E.A.P. after-school tutoring program dropped in to say thanks to Chi for helping. Claire invited members to bring their families to Hype's (Rockers' mascot) Trick-or-Treat Event to be a part of LEAP's and High Point Rockers' Book-A-Treat at Truist Stadium, High Point, on October 27. This is a free event with treats and activities. To date, Claire said L.E.A.P. had given out 2,000 books for the literacy campaign to bring books to children who cannot buy books. She thanked Chi Chapter for its donations.

Beginning Teacher Support: Carla Thomas, chair, announced that three new beginning teachers from Thomasville Middle and Carolina Christian Academy will receive gift cards.

Fund Raising: Susan Fleenor, chair, announced that Chi will host a spaghetti dinner, \$10 a ticket, at the home of Nancy Spurgeon. In case of inclement weather, the event will take place at Life on Lexington, 620 East Lexington Avenue, High Point. Members will supply makings for spaghetti, salad, desserts, and drinks. Cornhole and other games will be available for guests. More information to come.

Hospitality: Lyn Chandler, chair, is helping with the fund raisers. Thanks were given to Lyn and her committee for serving a beautiful table of food before our meeting began.

Education Law and Policy: Amanda Thompson, chair, stressed the need for all members to stay aware of what is going on at our state legislature. She noted the need to raise teacher pay and to provide more support for the teacher and student in the classroom. Amanda entered a wonderful review and link in our last newsletter to politicized issues affecting our teachers and students.

Finance Report: Nancy Tucker, treasurer, asked President Rosenquist to present the current report as seen here. Martha Alley made a motion to accept the budget as previously given to all members and approve the financial report as was published in the September Keynotes. Susan Fleenor seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Old Business:

An electronic survey through Survey Monkey overseen by Anne Sheffield for the Executive Board, was 31 to 4 to amend Chi Chapter rules to be in line with International rules regarding when induction ceremonies take place. Note that the new wording is in bold print. The change in our rule will read: "In addition to any other Chi induction ceremony during the year, an induction ceremony for new members of the three chapters shall be held at the spring banquet, under the direction of the Coordinating Council Chairman. An individual becomes a member of the Society when she pays her dues." Christina Mayhand called for its approval with Kay Tucker seconding the proposal. The vote was unanimous to approve the change.

New Business:

The Executive Board asked Mary Ann Hart to propose that \$5.00 be added to Collegiate dues since only International and the NC DKG received monies for a Collegiate member. This means that a collegiate member would pay \$20 to International, \$5 to the state and \$5 to Chi. That \$5 will help bolster the Chi budget. Christina Mayhand made the motion to accept, and Betty Mayer seconded. Motion passed unanimously.

Announcements: President Rosenquist announced that \$20 for the Holiday Tea should be sent to Nancy Tucker by November 1, 2023.

President Rosenquist adjourned the meeting at 7:20 PM.
